About NFCAA

The Beginning of NFCAA

On January 8, 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson announced his War on Poverty by introducing legislation that would expand the federal government's role in poverty reduction efforts. The Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 created the framework for community action agencies to help fight America's War on Poverty. The Northeast Florida Community Action Agency, Inc. (NFCAA) was established as an agency with a driving force to combat poverty in Northeast Florida.

NFCAA, formerly known as the Greater Jacksonville Economic Opportunity, Inc. held its first board meeting on April 27, 1965. The Agency began its operations with a \$32,210 grant from the Office of Economic Opportunity which was followed by a Head Start grant in the amount of \$117,917 to serve 1,085 preschool children.

Agency Overview

NFCAA is a private nonprofit 501©3 community action agency. The Agency receives funding to combat poverty in the following seven counties located in Northeast Florida: Baker, Clay, Duval, Flagler, Nassau, Putnam, and St. Johns. NFCAA continually acts as an advocate for low-income communities, while also operating a variety of programs designed to improve these communities and help families become stable and/or self-sufficient. In fiscal year 2018, NFCAA provided assistance to 18,329 individuals and 7,316 families.

With 54 years of experience, NFCAA is committed to providing a comprehensive and holistic approach to services for entire families. The Agency is dedicated to establishing mutually beneficial partnerships that connect families to available resources, stabilize vulnerable households, and promote healthy families and communities.



NFCAA currently receives its major funding from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO). DEO provides funding for core community action programs such as the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP). NFCAA also receives funding from private corporations and local governments to assist with accomplishing its mission. NFCAA's funding level for fiscal year 2018 was \$7,426,202.

Strategic Goals

NFCAA developed four (4) strategic goals that will help enhance Agency performance, combat poverty, as well as achieve outcomes and results.

- NFCAA will increase partnerships among supporters and providers of services to low-income people.
- NFCAA will increase Agency capacity to achieve results.






Family: Household Type Totals: 7,593




Persons: Gender Totals: 18,811




Persons: Education Totals: 8,328




Family: Income Source Totals: 7,276






Persons: Race Totals: 17,943

Family Self-Sufficiency Program

The Family Self-Sufficiency Program (FSSP) helps individuals and families support themselves so they no longer need public assistance. Participants must have a desire to become self-sufficient and a willingness to take the steps necessary to make it happen.


Ms. Erika Wright is a divorced mother of five children, ages 16, 14, 11, 9 and 2. With this change in her life, Ms. Wright quickly realized that effective decision-making would have a direct impact on the lives of her children. Without hesitation, she decided to pursue an education in order to become better equipped to provide for her family.

Ms. Wright began her journey with NFCAA's Family Self-Sufficiency Program under the direction of former Family Development Specialist, Stephani Benn, and completed her goals with Family Development Specialist, Diane Durham.

Ms. Wright enrolled in Fortis College in pursuit of a Sterile Processing Technician Certification. In case you didn't know, sterile processing technicians are responsible for ensuring that laboratory and healthcare equipment is cleaned and sterilized properly (very important). She made the President's List four times, the Dean's List one time, passed the certification exam, and graduated with honors with a 3.8 GPA, while taking care of her five children.

Ms. Wright is currently employed at Baptist Hospital's Orthopedic Institute Department as a Prep and Sterile Technician.

"I am so grateful to the Northeast Florida Community Action Agency for assisting me along the way with resources and information I needed to reach my goal. Now I am gainfully employed in my field of study, and I can say with pride that I have a career and not just a job...If I can do it; anyone can, don't give up, stay focused and don't get distracted."





Success Story

Family Self-Sufficiency Program

Chantel Johnson

The Confidence to Achieve! Ms. Johnson is a mother of four. She was working as a Direct Care Professional with an income below the poverty level. With no money saved and a low-paying job, she inquired about the Family Self-Sufficiency Program at NFCAA.

When Ms. Johnson first came to NFCAA, she expressed her interest in obtaining a Commercial Driver's License (CDL). She and her case manager (Family Service Specialist) focused on goals that would help her become self-sufficient. They included maintaining a permanent residence, finding reliable child care and securing stable employment.

In order to reach her goal of selfsufficiency, she attended CDL training and received special recognition for graduating top of the class. "As a single mother, I often made excuses to my children when they asked to go places or needed to purchase something. I no longer use excuses, instead, I tell them to wait until I get paid!"

Ms. Johnson was immediately offered several employment opportunities. She accepted a position in public transportation as a driver. She is now employed full-time and with benefits. The benefits include health insurance and a retirement plan.

What do you want in life? Perhaps for now, it seems virtually impossible to attain that goal, but keep in mind that you're not alone. Ms. Johnson's determination and positive attitude helped her excel in the Family Self-Sufficiency Program as well as other areas. Most successful individuals face the same struggles before they reach the peak of success!

Assisting Underserved Families

Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP)

WAP helps lower utility costs for eligible customers by replacing or repairing elements of a home that contribute to energy waste. The program is operational in Baker, Duval, Flagler, Nassau, and Putnam Counties.

WAP assists homeowners and renters with gross incomes up to 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines with priority given to seniors, individuals with disabilities, and households with children. Repairs may include improving heating and air conditioning methods, attic/floor insulation, low flow shower heads, and minor ceiling/floor/wall repairs.

In addition to improving the efficiency and safety of homes, WAP engages local contractors for weatherization work; that helps to support the economy throughout Northeast Florida. In fiscal year 2018, NFCAA weatherized 105 homes.

LIHEAP

LIHEAP assists low-income households with immediate and emergency home needs. NFCAA makes direct payments to utility companies when a family does not have funds and is in danger of having their utilities disconnected. Services are provided to families in need, with emphasis placed on the elderly, individuals with disabilities, and households with children younger than five years of age. Providing utility assistance to seniors keeps them from having to choose among paying their utility bills, purchasing food, or buying needed medications. In Fiscal Year 2018, NFCAA provided emergency utility assistance to 5,583 households and 5,758 households received non-emergency utility assistance.

Asset Building and Financial Literacy



Changing the mindset of people to manage money wisely is a key factor in promoting financial literacy. Managing and staying in charge of finances is a lifetime effort. Contributing to this problem is the fact that low-income individuals lack adequate income, generally assuming that the quantity of their income need not be managed.

NFCAA and its financial community partners provide financial literacy training throughout Northeast Florida. In addition to this training, NFCAA partners with United Way through its Real Sense Prosperity Campaign to provide free tax preparation for its customers. NFCAA helps customers identify Earned Income Tax Credits (EITC), eliminating expensive fees paid to private tax preparers. NFCAA completed 171 tax returns and assisted in obtaining \$222,353 in income tax refunds.



Community Revitalization In North Riverside



Holiday Gala

NFCAA sponsored a Holiday Gala in conjunction with the North Riverside Community Association. It was an excellent gathering filled with great food, great people and great conversation.



Lights and Locks

Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) is a multidisciplinary approach-to-deterring criminal behavior. NFCAA provided "Lights and Locks" to six (6) homes in the North Riverside neighborhood. Locks were installed to control access to homes and porch lights for safety. Homeowners welcomed the project as a way to exhibit signs of homeownership.

Beautification

NFCAA completed beautification on six (6) homes located in the North Riverside area of Jacksonville. Homeowners teamed with NFCAA to add greenery, flowers, and other landscaping upgrades to improve appearance. It was about more than just fixing up yards. It was about looking beyond their front door and viewing where they live as a community.

National Night Out (Against Crime)

Over 300 community members joined NFCAA for this annual community-building campaign promoting police-community partnerships, and neighborhood camaraderie to make it a safer, better place to live.









NFCAA held a Board and Executive Leadership Training. The board retreat is a time to regroup, reconnect, and recharge the passion for the agency's mission.

Training Outcomes:

- Increase the overall capacity and effectiveness of NFCAA's Board of Directors and Executive Management.
- Increase understanding of needs facing low-income individuals in NFCAA's service area.
- Enhance knowledge of Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA).
- A better understanding of NFCAA's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats.









NFCAA's Data Busters Youth Employment and Training Program completed its 34th year of operating, serving 173 students in its seven county service area.

NFCAA in conjunction with local colleges, school districts and other community partners conducts the Data Busters Summer Employment and Training Program. This program provides youth, ages 14-17, with the opportunity to increase their knowledge about computers and enhance their employability skills. Data Busters also assists participants in working toward achieving specific youth development outcomes to ensure future success. This innovative program provides youth the opportunity to gain work experience, earn money, and learn to navigate their way around computers and the World Wide Web.

Program benefits include:

- Improved social/emotional development
- Increased academic or social skills for school success
- Improved physical health and development
- Avoidance of risk-taking behavior

NFCAA also sponsored "Professional Friday" at each site where businesses spoke with students about their particular workplace. Students also give back to the communities in which they live by participating in community service projects.

Top performers of the Data Buster program won a laptop and printer, while second best performers received a Samsung Galaxy Tab E.

One recipient each year is chosen for the Future Leaders Award and presented with a \$500 scholarship.




